London Wildlife Trust is the only charity dedicated to protecting London's wildlife, engaging local communities through outdoor learning, volunteering and access to our nature reserves. In a city facing development pressure and a rising population, where people are increasingly disconnected from their natural environment, we believe we can create real change. We manage 36 nature reserves and manage five 'hub sites' as centres for learning, volunteering and other urban conservation activities. Over our 35-year history, we have delivered a wide range of projects to engage London's communities in the protection and conservation of wildlife, including work with children and young people, families, and socially excluded groups. Our work with young people

As outlined in our five-year Strategic Plan, one of our key aims is to provide hands-on, informative and inspirational outdoor learning experiences for Londoners, including 'the delivery of innovative programmes of activities **for, and with, young people**.'

One of our key areas of work with young people has been the Keeping it Wild programme, which since 2018, has successfully inspired over 1000 young people aged 11-25 to become actively involved in the protection and promotion of London's natural heritage.

Young people took part in nature conservation projects in their local communities, completed paid traineeships and were involved with our Young People's Forum with the overall aim of making nature more inclusive, accessible and relevant to young people living in London. The project really set out to help change the face of the environmental movement!

We now have a dedicated **Youth Programmes team** at the Trust which are continuing to deliver the paid traineeship scheme, build strong partnerships with youth groups/organisations and coordinate the Trust's Youth Board.





Youth Board & Young Advisors

What is the Youth Board?

Following on from the fantastic work that the Keeping it Wild Youth Forum achieved from 2018-2021 (including influencing our comms, Equality, Diversity & Inclusion work and creating the new <u>Wild</u> <u>Youth Hub</u>), we are placing youth voices right at the heart of the Trust's governance structure in the form of a new Youth Board.

The Youth Board will consist of 12 motivated young people (aged 16-25) who are passionate about London's wildlife and ensuring young people's voices are heard. In addition to this, there is the opportunity for 3 members of the Youth Board to be Young Advisors.

The Youth Board will:


- Help to implement the Trust's Strategic Plan, particularly on how the Trust can better engage young people from a range of backgrounds;
- Have the opportunity to share their ideas, experiences and opinions by contributing towards blog posts, interviews, social media or film content;
- Help create materials and curate events (including our annual Green Jobs Fair) to inspire more young people to get involved with the Trust;
- Have the opportunity to represent the Trust at events (in person and online)

Young Advisors will also:

- Be spokespeople for the Youth Board;
- Co-ordinate and lead Youth Board meeting with support from the Youth Programmes team;
- Determine the content and agenda for Youth Forum meetings with support from Youth Programmes Team;
- Represent the Youth Board at Board Meetings with Trustees and Senior Management Team and working group meetings with staff (e.g. outdoor learning, health and safety, conservation, equality, diversity and inclusion, comms and marketing).

- Interested in learning more about the environment, urban nature conservation


and how to get more people from all backgrounds standing up for nature on their doorsteps.

- 4 Youth Board meetings per year (plus training and preparation for meetings eg reviewing doc, agendas etc)
- Young Advisors will also attend at least 1 Trustee Board meeting per year and the option to join quarterly staff working group meetings.







What we will offer you in return

- We will cover your travel expenses to meetings/events you attend and we will provide lunch/snacks/refreshments;
- We are also able to offer financial reimbursement for some opportunities undertaken with the Trust outside of the youth board meetings (e.g. for representing the Trust at external events);
- Mentoring from our trustees and senior management team;
- Regular training opportunities on a wide range of topics for your personal development including:
- Youth Leadership Training (OCN Level 1 accredited) from London Youth;
- Presentation skills, public speaking, charity governance;
- CV/Careers workshops;
- Talks and presentations from staff (e.g species ID and habitat management, fundraising, project management, communications and marketing);
